Field Scabious (Knautia arvensis)

Some plants attract different species of butterflies and bees that will pollinate the flowers, this in turn provides a food source for birds and other animals.

The Wild Flower Garden

This small area was planted with wild flowers and shrubs when Brook Park was officially opened in June 2010. Its intention is to diversify the plant and insect species that grow in and visit the park. It has been fenced off to ensure the plants do not get grazed by rabbits, other small mammals and not trampled by dogs and park users.

Most wild flowers thrive in poor soil conditions, hence the flowers do well here even though the soil in the park is mostly clay and of low fertility.
